ACKNOWLEDGING THE JOURNEY: FREEDOM, RESILIENCE, LIBERATION, AND EMPOWERMENT

The University of Hartford, along with other institutions of higher education and people across the country, celebrates Juneteenth.

Observed on June 19, Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day, marked a turning point in Black history. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, declaring a formal end to slavery in the United States. However, change was not instant. Nearly two and a half years later, on June 19, 1865, enslaved African Americans in Galveston, Texas received the news from Union army troops that freedom had finally come. The following year, the people of Galveston commemorated that day as Juneteenth. On June 17, 2021, President Biden signed into law a bill making Juneteenth a federally-recognized holiday.
